Supplemental Various training courses are available to improve understanding of the safety requirements for a variety of outdoor activities. See the BSA "Guide to Safe Scouting" for age-appropriate activities.

Advanced Wood Badge for the 21st Century. Wood Badge has evolved into the core leadership skills training course for the BSA. The new Wood Badge course focuses on strengthening every volunteer's ability to work with and lead groups of youths and adults.

Training Course Sequence

Step 1:

Youth Protection Training

Because of the great concern the Boy Scouts of America has concerning child abuse in our society, Youth Protection Training has been developed to safeguard both youth and adult members in the scouting program. Youth Protection MUST be renewed every two years.

Step 2:

Fast Start

As the first step in the training continuum, Fast Start Training is meant to provide all the information and resources for new leaders to conduct their first meeting, along with guidance for the meetings that follow. .

Step 3:

Leader Specific

Specialized knowledge for each leadership role. *On completion of this step, the trained patch has been earned.*

Additional Training:

Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation –BALOO

A one-day training event that introduces the skills needed to plan and conduct pack outdoor activities.

Outdoor Webelos Leader Training—OWL

Designed specifically for Webelos den leaders and their assistants, this course teaches outdoor-related skills through demonstration and hands-on practice.

Outdoor Leader Skills

Required outdoor training for Scoutmasters and ASMs. The skills required for the Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class ranks.

Training Course for a Tour Plan

Youth Protection—expires every two years

Hazardous Weather—expires every two years

BALOO—for Cub Scout Overnighters, no expiration

Climb On Safely / Safe Swim Defense / Safety A Float—required for specialized activities.

Activity Standards: Where swimming or boating is included in the program, Safe Swim Defense and/or Safety A oar are to be followed. If climbing/rappelling is included, then Climb On Safely must be followed. At least one person must be current in CPR/AED from any recognized agency to meet Safety A at and Climb On Safely guidelines. At least one adult on a pack overnighter must have completed Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO). At least one adult must have completed Planning and Preparing for Hazardous Weather training for all tours and activities. Trek Safely and Basic First Aid are recommended for all tours, and Wilderness First Aid is recommended for all backcountry tours.

Where Do I Find My BSA ID Number - and why do I need one?

Your BSA ID Number is needed to create a MYSCOUTING account and to properly document your online training.

The National BSA office has developed a way to track your scouting experience and training through the National BSA web site (<http://www.scouting.org>) called “MYSCOUTING”.

When you first link to “MYSCOUTING” from the national website, you are prompted to register and build an account based on your BSA ID number.

There are three (3) basic ways of finding your BSA ID number for registering for with “MYSCOUTING”:

Look on the BSA ID card you received when your unit re-registered. The number appears on the bottom of the card. This is the easiest way to find the number and get started.

Look on the label of your Scouting magazine. This magazine is personalized for you depending on whether you are a Cub Scout Leader, Boy Scout Leader, or Venturing Leader, and also by your registered position. This label is printed on the magazine, not glued on. Your ID number is printed on the second line of the label.

Here are two examples of what you might see (we have highlighted where your ID number to emphasize its location). All BSA ID numbers is our Council should be either a 7-digit number beginning with a “36” or a”37” or a 9-digit number beginning with a “1”.
